July 8-10, 2016 - Ellis Bird Farm, Lacombe, Alberta, Canada This conference is open to everyone! If you appreciate nature and are interested in learning more about our remarkable wild neighbours, you will enjoy this conference.

We invite you to join us at the 39th annual North American Bluebird Society Conference! NABS 2016 will be held at Ellis Bird Farm, a non-profit bird education and research centre in Central Alberta. Ellis Bird Farm is a unique facility that operates both as a working farm as well as an organization devoted to the conservation, education and research of native cavity-nesting birds and other wildlife.

The theme of NABS 2016 will be about the secrets of bird migration, and how new technologies are providing insights into the remarkable migration journeys of Purple Martins and Mountain Bluebirds. The conference will include presentations by leading scientists, opportunities to network with fellow bluebirders, vendor displays and field trip days to local areas of interest.

Trail Monitors Agreement and GPS

The Mountain Bluebird Trails Conservation Society is trying to develop complete records of the trails, the number of boxes and their location, as well as contact information for trail monitors. Toward that end, it has developed a Trail Monitor's Agreement. All trail monitors are asked to fill out the agreement shown here and return it to: Who????

Trail Monitor Agreement

I	am a volunteer with the Mountain
Bluebird Trails Conservation	Society (MBTCS.) I understand that MBTCS
owns the boxes, and that I a	m chief caretaker of the boxes as a trail
monitor!	

In return for obtaining boxes from MBTCS, I will submit the GPS locations of my trail of boxes to the Trail Master, faithfully clean and record activity in the boxes, and send this important data to MBTCS annually (September 10) In maintaining the habitat for Mountain Bluebirds, tree swallows, and house wrens; I will maintain the boxes where I can, and report damage and request repairs when needed. It is my responsibility to contact and report data to the society regularly.

When I am no longer able to be responsible for my trail, I will notify MBTCS, to enable another MBTCS volunteer, to be the caretaker of the boxes!
